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Keeping the Undertakers Alive

This photo shows the condition of Nelson's Undertakers' building in the mid-1980s before it was renovated to become the Resource Centre for the Linton and District Historical Society. Over 25 years later, the building is looking somewhat better. However, it is now in need of further work to repair the deterioration resulting from the wear and tear of time. These repairs will also ensure that our valuable archival material, stored within the building, does not suffer damage, in particular from damp.

Article in Society Notes prompts memories of the Hishion Family

Society member **Barry Hishion** has sent us the following memories that were stimulated by the article on the 150th anniversary of the Linton Cricket Club that was published in our last issue of Society Notes

The names accompanying the photo of the 1895 Cricket Club that appeared on the front cover of the May issue of Society Notes, drew my attention, for I spied in it the name of my father's uncle Robert Hisshion and his son Bobby, my dad's cousin. Bobby was born in Fitzroy on 20 May 1883, so when the photo was taken he was aged about 12. [His father] Robert (1862) and my grandfather Daniel (1861) were both born in Linton.

When Bobby's mother Hannah died in 1900, Robert remarried that year, to the young Annie McDonald (1874) who hailed from Langi Willi. Annie was born at Skipton, the daughter of Norman and Ann MacDonald (nee McMaster). Bobby, then 17, didn't take too kindly to his step mother, so departed Linton and found work in the Waihi gold mine in New Zealand. In doing this he followed many Ballarat district miners who were then doing likewise.

Robert and Annie had two sons, born at Geelong, namely Daniel (1901) and Norman (1903). In 1903 Robert left mining work at Pitfield Plains and took his family to New Zealand, there joining Bobby at the Waihi mine. He was not to return to Linton, for in 1909 he died aged 47 from *'Phthisis Asthenia'* (TB), a name commonly used then for miners' disease.

In 1912 following a big strike at the mine, Annie returned to Geelong with her two boys and in 1913, there married Thomas Walters. Thomas died in 1940 and in 1950 Annie passed away at Geelong.

Not long after his father's passing in 1909 Bobby married a very young Hilda Beaney. They had two daughters, Katherine Nora and Mary Pearl. The marriage ended in divorce. Bobby became a drainage contractor after moving to live in the Auckland suburb of Mt Eden. It was there that he married the widowed Sarah Anderson who predeceased him. He died at Mt Eden aged 79 in 1962.

Bobby's mother Hannah and my grandmother Mary Ellen (nee Wright) were sisters, both born in Collingwood. The spelling of our surname has a variation. Thereby hangs a miner's tale!

Proposed New Constitution for the Society

This issue of Society notes contains a proposed new Constitution, or Rules, for the Society, and at the AGM on Monday 16 September a motion will be put that the Society adopt this document as its Constitution, or Rules.

This new constitution will bring our rules into line with the requirements of the new *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (Vic)* which was passed by the Parliament of Victoria last year. This Act provides a re-vamp of the laws dealing with 'not-for-profit' organisations. The Act also provides for a new set of *Model Rules* with which the constitution, or rules, of an incorporated association are expected to comply. Our proposed new constitution is based on those Model Rules, with a couple of minor modifications to reflect our particular organisational structure.

From a practical perspective, the adoption of the new constitution will not require any changes to the day-today running of the Society. There are some slight changes to how the secretary must submit the annual financial statements of the Society to the State Government's regulatory authority, and there are very helpful guidelines relating to members' rights, grievance procedures etc.

Aaron recounted conversations he remembered having with his grandfather Ron Preston, a local storekeeper, and the many stories about his ancestors, the Morgan, Cornish, Chibnall, Preston and Kerr families and their associations with Linton and the Mannibadar district over five generations. Aaron's memories were extensive and amazingly detailed and his interest in his family history and the history of Linton are quite remarkable for a relatively young person!

We thank Aaron for sharing with us his family history and for making the night a most enjoyable one for all present. The night's proceedings were recorded and **a DVD is available for purchase from the Society.**

A Word from the President

Outcomes of grants for building repairs

Much of my report in the last edition of *Society Notes* was taken up with discussion of the poor state of repair of the two heritage buildings that the Historical Society cares for – the old Undertakers' building that is our Resource Centre and the 1874 Library next door for which we are the committee of management.

We have had some good luck and some bad luck with regard to the grants that we applied for to facilitate repairs to these buildings.

Golden Plains Shire Grant

We obtained \$2,500 from the Golden Plains Shire Community Grant, which was unfortunately only half of what we applied for, the Shire having reduced its overall allocation for community grants this year from \$130,000 to \$84, 832 in order, they said, to enable a reduction in Council rates. We had asked for \$5,000 to go towards the **replacement of the roof at the old Undertakers' building,** with the Society contributing the remaining \$3,140 needed for the project. After further discussion with Council, during which they agreed that it was not possible to replace half the roof, they decided to make up the balance required from their maintenance budget. Since the building is Shire-owned this seems a logical outcome. We are hoping to commence the roof replacement within the next couple of months.

Conservation Plan for the Library

Our application to the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal for \$5,000 towards the cost of a professional **Conservation Management Plan (CMP) for our 1874 Library** was unfortunately rejected. However, prior to our learning this, the Shire (who also own this building) had offered to make up the balance needed for the CMP, amounting to \$6,000.Tthe Shire's heritage advisor, David Rowe, who was to undertake the CMP has since offered to do so for half price as a community service, as long as the Historical Society can assist by doing some of the historical research involved. So we hope that this project will still now go ahead before the end of this year.

Help from Imerys

Further good news - **Imerys Minerals**, who operate the Kaolin mine in Linton, have repaired the badly rotten window at our Resource Centre (the old Undertakers' building) and are planning on doing further repairs to weatherboards and the front veranda. Many thanks once again to Brad Haywood from Imerys for initiating this work.

A new Publishing Venture

Meanwhile, we have commenced work on our next publishing project, a book of historical photographs entitled, *Linton: a Photographic History*, for which the Society received a Local History Grant from the State Government last year. The book will contain about 100 pages of our historic photographs in a 'coffee-table' style format, depicting Linton's history over the past 150 years. As there is no published history of Linton in print at the moment, this project will fill an important gap.

I look forward to seeing many of you at our Annual General Meeting on Monday 16 September and at our big fundraising concert on 6 October at Carngham Uniting Church (see elsewhere in this edition for details).
